EDITOR'S NOTES

Our cover this month is taken from the collection of photographs of West Lavington life during the past hundred or so years. The figure portrayed is Alfred Thomas Holliday who was well known in the village. There are many of us who still remember his much loved daughter, Florence, who was active in village and church matters until her death about ten years ago.

Alfred was born in 1871 in West Lavington, the son of James and Esther Holliday. James was a painter by trade, and came from Essex. Esther Duck was a local girl, and the family settled in Littleton Panell where Alfred grew up with an older sister, Edith.

Alfred began his working life as an apprentice bootmaker, with Joe Raine, who was then living opposite the Churchill Arms. However his chief interest was always in bicycles. He married Edith Mary Bartlett in 1898 and in 1901 they were briefly the landlords of the Bridge Inn.

By 1911 Alfred and Edith had five daughters, Florence being the youngest, and they had left the Bridge Inn. Alfred was in business as a cycle dealer. His business started in Market Lavington, but he moved to the Wheatsheaf Inn, (later the Stagepost), where he was able to run the pub and a cycle shop adjacent to it. As his business grew he moved to Vine Villa, a house which was situated where the Courtyard Surgery is now. He set up a cycle shop there, and during the twentieth century he extended it into a garage which was later taken over by Harold Wadman and then his son Basil and thereafter by Basil's son, Mark.

IN CASE YOU HAVE FORGOTTEN

December 25th is not just Christmas Day It is also the day when West Lavington's COSTCUTTER is open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Therefore no last minutes emergencies!

JAMES CAMPBELL WALKS THE PILGRIM'S WAY, HOLY ISLAND

I've just stayed on the Holy Island of Lindisfarne off the Northumbrian coast. It's an ancient site of Celtic Christianity where the saints Aidan and then Cuthbert lived. It is approached by a causeway which is covered by the tide for five hours twice every 24 hours.

On the last day I walked the Pilgrim's Way, the route taken to the island by pilgrims since the 7th Century over the sands at low tide following large wooden posts. On a windy, cool and overcast Wednesday, two hours after high tide, I set off walking barefooted, the approved method.

My feet quickly became cold. However I noticed that as I focused on other things, I became less aware of them. I've noticed that as we focus on other people we tend to become less aware of our own worries.

I came across part of a dead bird in the water. I wondered what its story had been and, in a place of such antiquity, I reflected on how short the journey is from cradle to grave for all of us.

At one stage I came to gloppy mud, brown on top and black underneath; it was also slippery. A fellow pilgrim who'd walked earlier in the week had fallen flat on her face in it. The top of a wellie poking out of the mud suggested that another traveller's day hadn't ended as planned. It reminded me that in life one slip, one ill-considered word, can totally change our lives.

It's essential to take wet-weather kit but otherwise to travel light. I reflected that we often carry excess baggage: regrets from the past and fears about the future as well as present concerns and responsibilities.

Along the route there are two wooden refuge boxes on stilts 15' above the sea. As I ate my lunch in them, they swayed gently in the strong wind: a little unnerving. Not even the safest places are completely safe; only God is.

As I continued, the tide began to race in. The strength of the current reminded me though we may feel we're in control of our lives, that isn't really true.

Throughout the sun threatened to break through; the prospect of a better day. Finally, as I walked home up the road after an hour and a half, it finally came out: hope realised, the story of the Christian Faith.

BLOOD DONING IN THE LAVINGTONS

The Bath Blood Team visited the villages for four days during 2012 and you good folk donated over 300 "pints".

Nowadays a whole blood donation is rarely transfused; your blood is taken straight back to the processing labs in Bristol, and is then split into its component parts of red cells, white cells, plasma and platelets, which means that even more patients can be helped (could be over 1200!).

I know how very grateful the recipients, and their families, are to you for giving up your time and blood to help them, so please continue to support the Blood Service.

A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

It may be dark and cold outside but, you may agree, we can look back on quite a year. I, for one, have already forgotten the rain. (*Editor's note – this, unfortunately, was written before the third week of November!*)

Nationally, we celebrated the Diamond Jubilee in patriotic style and the union flag appeared everywhere as it has not done in my lifetime. The Olympics, despite all our fears, were fantastic and we were proud of everything – the stadium, the games makers (many locals amongst them), the ceremonies and, not least, the sport. Never before have Olympians and Para-Olympians so inspired us. On almost all counts, our nation showed its outstanding qualities, of which we can be proud.

Here in Wiltshire, the Queen's visit to Salisbury was particularly memorable for me for the sight of the Duke of Edinburgh struggling to resist a glass of Wadworth's beer in the Devizes tent. The Olympic torch provided an excuse for a spectacular gathering at Hudson's Field.

If those shows were not enough, the Council also rather grandly opened our new County Hall together with the new Trowbridge Library when government minister Baroness Hayman heaped praise on Wiltshire Council. This came just a week after Lord Heseltine had publicly commended Wiltshire Council for its bold move in adopting unitary status and highlighted the massive efficiencies and savings that this has delivered.

Recently, we have also seen the commitment to a new Science Park at Porton Down which both saves the current establishment and creates hundreds of new high tech jobs on the site. In addition, a new apprenticeship scheme in the County will lead to one thousand new apprenticeships being created for young people. Not least, the Council has placed the contract for superfast broadband to provide much better communications for communities in the Lavingtons & Erlestoke and across the county.

The weather may be getting colder outside and there may be economic and political troubles in Europe and across the globe. In Wiltshire, however, we can have some confidence in the future of our county, which we care so much about.

So as we approach the season of good will I wish you all a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

LITTLE CHEVERELL PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Little Cheverell Parish Council meeting on the 19th of November the council considered the application from The Owl for change of use to residential. This was a very well attended meeting and the Parish Council are grateful for the calm way in which everyone attending expressed their views. The Parish Council have decided to object to the planning application.

Also brought up at the meeting was that there has been trouble with sewers flooding in the village, due mostly to disposal of fats and disposable items such as wetwipes. The fats solidify quickly in the sewer and cause blockages at the lowest point in the drain. This blockage then leads to the manholes leaking sewage over residents' land and the road. The sewage could then drain into the river that flows through Little Cheverell, with potentially devastating effects for wildlife and a threat to public health.

Please follow the guidance from Wessex Water on disposing of fats oils and greases, and bag and bin any disposable items.

The next meeting of the Little Cheverell Parish Council will be on Thursday 17th of January 2013.

In 70 AD, nine hundred Jews held out for months against armies of Romans on a mountain outside the Judean desert. Masada. Alice Hoffman's epic novel, The Dovekeepers is based on this tragic event. Although this powerful book is a testament to the human spirit and to love rising from the ashes of war, it was deemed a brutal, harrowing and



haunting read. And members were surprised at the numerous references to selfharming in times of stress during this period. Although everyone thought it to be a superb contribution to twenty-first century literature, and it was much loved by some, no-one appeared to want to give the novel a second read!

Tim Pears, our second author, stated there were two primary subjects for fiction: war and families. By showing a family at war, Disputed Land shows that the world at large can be captured in microcosm: a single family can no more sort out its legacy than society can. Leonard and Rosemary Cannon summon their middle-aged offspring, along with their partners and children, to the family home in the Welsh Marshes for Christmas. There they are invited to put stickers on any furniture or items they wish to inherit. This modern thought-provoking tale was deemed a beautifully under-stated novel; well written, witty and full of fascinating characters. Several members went on to read Tim Pears' previous novel, Landed.
