## Dear Friends,

St. Valentine, Third Century Roman saint associated since the Middle Ages with a tradition of courtly love, makes his appearance to enliven the otherwise gloomy month of February.

A group of Liverpudlians once suggested that 'all you need is love'. Many people's experience would suggest that there is a bit more required to establishing worthwhile and lasting relationships.

Helen Rowland, an American journalist writing in the early Twentieth Century, had a rather different suggestion: 'to be happy with a man, you must understand him a lot and love him a little; to be happy with a woman, you must love her a lot and try not to understand her at all'.

To summarize -2015 was quite a contrast to many previous years in many respects. Temperatures down somewhat due to the fact we had a long cold spring followed by a fairly cool summer.

December this year was warmer than November but of course it's possible that winter is yet to come.

No extremes in temperature either maximums or minimums apart from one fairly warm day in July.

Minimum temperatures were not exceptionally low as can be seen above.

The only measurable snow fall was 1cm (0.39ins) on 3rd February with a few sleet showers at other times.

It is interesting to note that there were 26 "rain days" in November and a further 26 in December but fortunately totals were not excessive, unlike unfortunate residents further north.

Rainfall over all was considerably down on previous years which may come as a surprise.

## A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

At this time of year, for many in the public sector, the mind is focussed on money. Wiltshire Council, for example, will decide in February what level of council tax to set for the coming financial year that runs from April 2016 to March 2017. Although the figures are not yet determined, we know that the grant from government will again fall by a significant amount. Just like you, local government must balance its expenditure against its income so all departments across the council are yet again considering where savings can be made.

The task of deciding where to spend money is often not a matter of free choice. Many of the tasks undertaken by local government are laid down by statute and are thus obligations that cannot be avoided.

For example, any child that lives more than 3 miles from its designated school (2 miles for the under-eights) is entitled to free transport to that school. In a rural county like Wiltshire, that involves moving many thousands of children many miles every school day. The total cost over the year runs into several million pounds. It is a cost that cannot be avoided, although you may agree that it is spent in a good cause.

The council also spends several million pounds on supporting rural bus services. In this case, however, there is no obligation to do so. One such subsidised service is Wilts and Dorset service 2 between Devizes and Salisbury. In contrast, the X72 to Devizes and Bath is commercial and operates without subsidy. Wiltshire Council is consulting on where savings can be made and, if you are a bus user, I urge you to take part. Details can be found here http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/news/articles/bus-service-consultation.

Wiltshire Council also spends money on traffic management. You would think that painting a yellow line to control parking or moving a speed limit sign to a better position would be cheap and simple tasks. Indeed, the cost of actually painting the line or moving the sign is negligible. But the bureaucratic procedure required to issue a Traffic Regulation Order costs several thousand pounds, so the council is generally very reluctant to undertake these otherwise simple tasks.

Such examples are not uncommon. Therefore, if local government is to find the money to support good causes like rural bus services, a reduction in the burden of unnecessary, bureaucratic regulations would be a great help.

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## WEST LAVINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

**Your New Councillor**: At the end of 2015, councillors were delighted to welcome to the council Richard Scott as a new member. Richard was born in Devizes and spent his youth in Littleton Panell. He attended Dauntsey's School followed by study to become an architect. Much later, while employed at Lambeth Palace, his work culminated in a major role in organising the first opening of the Palace to the public as part of the celebrations for the Millennium.

On retirement in 2011, Richard returned to live, and build his own house, in Littleton Panell. He says that most of his grounding skills were learnt with the benefit of a Wiltshire Council Education Grant and he considers that the opportunity to serve on the Council will enable him to repay some of that debt.

**Precept:** The parish council has set the precept for its part of the Council Tax for 2016/17. The new annual rate is £62.95 for a Band D house - an increase of £5.67 over the whole year or 47 pence per month. This is the first increase since 2013 and takes account a significant fall in the grant provided to parish councils by Wiltshire Council (down from £613 in 15/16 to £110 in 16/17). At the same time, Wiltshire Council is encouraging parish councils to take on a higher share of local services.

The parish council will continue support for community assets and facilities, which may include the Village Hall and Youth Club, the BMX track, rights of way and new projects while at the same time covering parish commitments such as salaries, insurance, and grass cutting. Continued improvement of our reserves at the insistence of our auditors has also been a consideration.

**Fracking:** Under the Petroleum Act 1998, licences have been offered to South Western Energy Limited to explore coal bed methane extraction at certain sites in Wiltshire including block ST95 – Erlestoke which takes in Littleton Panell.

The award of a licence does not automatically give permission for operations to begin. The operator is required to engage in pre-application discussion with Wiltshire Country Council, statutory consultees and local communities. Necessary planning and regulatory consents are also required. We will keep you informed should any planning applications be received for this parish under the newly granted licences.

The results when collated will then be analysed. They will be published as soon as possible. We are very pleased with the number of households and other stakeholders who took the trouble to reply to this important issue for our parish.

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has years been recording rainfall, temperature and sunshine hours in Great Cheverell for many.

Our main speaker for the evening was Ruth Gaddum, a garden designer. Formerly a microbiologist, she retrained as a garden designer to give herself the flexibility necessary to bring up a young family. In her talk A pot full of garden design, Ruth outlined for us the main principles of garden design and the processes you would need to go through to decide on the best plan for your own garden. She used photographs of 'before' and 'after' in some of her projects, and also some of famous gardens, to illustrate the talk.

Whenever a garden designer is called in to a client the first job is to establish what the client needs from their garden. Some need an oasis of tranquility, others an entertainment space, or space for children to play, and more often than not people have a combination of requirements. Next they will undertake a site survey measuring the area, plotting existing boundaries, noting things that the client wants or needs to keep, and also noting things outside the area that the client might like to use as a focal point, such as a beautiful view or a nice building. There may also be things that the client would like to screen, such as a noisy road or an ugly building. A soil survey is usually done so that the right plants can be chosen for that soil type. Also on the scale diagram will be compass points so that sunny aspects and shade areas can be identified and used to best advantage.

Ruth explained how we could go through the same processes with our own gardens. She described how to make a scale diagram and how to measure up, triangulating from a fixed point. She also advised taking photos of the garden explaining that viewing a photo took a lot of the emotion out of your impression of how your garden looked. And when you came to decide on the design she said there were six main principles to follow. Firstly you should keep it simple. Secondly there should be a unity of design that joined things together in both the hard landscaping and the planting. There should also be balance. Proportion and

scale should not be overlooked and you should remember that garden space is 3D. As well as function the garden should provide interest.

Ruth's talk was inspiring and informative. By the end of the evening she had the audience identifying good and bad design in some photographs that she had provided. We will all be viewing our gardens with a more critical eye and some of us will be emboldened to make some design changes.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday, 9th February. Liz Read, who runs a garden club in a local school, will discuss school gardening across the world in a a talk entitled School Gardening- Why, How and Who. Meet at 7.15 p.m. for 7.30 p.m. at Great Cheverell Village Hall. New members are always welcome. For non-members there will be a charge of  $\pounds$ 2 for the meeting.

## EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH What's the Christian faith ever done for us?

There have been a number of gloomy articles of late (gloomy for me, at least) on the apparent decline on Christianity in our country. Church attendance is plummeting and when the church hits the news it is often for the wrong reasons. The Christian faith no longer shapes our culture and moral outlook as it once did in this country. Yet, Richard Dawkins of all people recently commented, 'I have mixed feelings about the decline of Christianity, in so far as Christianity might be a bulwark against something worse.' In other words the arch-atheist has to admit that Christianity is of at least some benefit to society. That is indeed the case. The Christian faith asserts the unique value and dignity of each and every human being and insists that all human beings should be loved and cared for from womb to tomb. The belief that all human beings are made in the image of God has spurned a host of causes that have let to the abolition of slavery, improved working conditions, universal education and so on. Not to mention the impact of the Bible on literature and the arts.

But all these things are by-products of the Christian faith. The big thing is that God loves human beings and that he sent his Son into the world as one of us that we may be forgiven and have hope in the face of death. That's why Jesus came, died on the cross and rose again from the dead. Those who believe in him are called to follow him and put his teaching into practice. As they do that at home, in the workplace, in the community, in our nation and on the world's stage believers try and make a difference, however small that may be. While it seems to be the case that many half-hearted churchgoers have given up on things here in the UK, there are still millions of people at home and abroad whose lives have been transformed by knowing Jesus and devoting their lives to serving him by helping others.

To return to my question, 'What's the Christian faith ever done for us?' Quite a bit, actually. But the key factor is not that Christianity may act as bulwark against negative elements in our society, but that it points us to Jesus as the way, the truth, and the life.
