A MESSAGE FROM RICHARD GAMBLE Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons & Erlestoke Division

I hope you are surviving in these unusual times!

Wiltshire Council is very active in supporting the residents of the county and Wellbeing Hub is continuing to work at pace to provide support and guidance for the most vulnerable members of our community.

The Wellbeing hub has, at the time of writing:

- delivered over 793 food parcels
- contacted over 9,541 people
- received 2,563 calls

• received 1,065 emails

We have also created an online interactive map that allows people to see what COVID-19 community support is available in their neighbourhood and throughout the county. The map can be found at www.wiltshire.gov.uk/public-health-coronavirus.

The council has designed some posters for residents who are unable to answer the door due self-isolating or social-distancing measures. The posters, which provide instructions to for people making deliveries, can be downloaded from our Covid-19 webpage.

The community response to the ongoing COVID-19 situation has been, and continues to be, fantastic and we thank local businesses for their kind help and support.

Any shops or businesses that can help with the supply of bed linen are asked to email HeadsofServiceAdultcare@wiltshire.gov.uk with the subject line **Bed linen support**. The supplies are needed at County Hall, Trowbridge and at Monkton Park, Chippenham and can be delivered during office hours or alternatively the council can collect items.

The Avon and Wiltshire Mental Health Partnership (AWP) NHS Trust has provided an update on the provision of mental healthcare services in the region. It's crisis and intensive teams and urgent and emergency referrals continue to operate and respond as usual, and a **new mental healthcare helpline (0300 303 1320)** has been launched, which operates in Wiltshire seven days a week, 24 hours a day.

Some other services have been suspended but I hope you are getting all the support you need.

We continue to open our school to children of key workers and vulnerable children, with staff coming in on a rota to look after this small group of children each day, including the Easter holidays. As well as a bit of academic work, we are doing lots of other lovely activities with these children – painting a huge

rainbow on the glass hall doors, gardening in our raised beds to grow vegetables, chalk art on the playground and lots of sports.

Meanwhile, the vast majority of our children are staying at home to help win this battle against the virus. We have been hugely impressed with how our families have embraced the virtual learning platform, with children carrying out their daily learning tasks, submitting projects to their teachers who assess them and return with comments, and having some contact with their teacher and with each other in this difficult time. When we re-open the school, our children will be very well placed to take up their school learning journey again with all their skills honed and rehearsed.

Bags for A&E

When our staff heard that staff in a local A&E would benefit from having drawstring bags to put dirty clothing in after a shift, to prevent contamination of their homes, they set out to make as many bags as possible – in between their day jobs of managing the distance learning and caring for the children of key workers. Within a few days, heaps of bags had arrived at school made by our staff and their families and friends, and were sent on to our precious and valued front line workers. We had a lovely photo of delighted NHS staff holding our bags, and saying thank you to our staff. Working together as a community of love and support is the best way to win this battle.

Meanwhile

Our wheat has germinated beautifully and is flourishing on the school field. We look forward to harvesting it in September, grinding it and making our own bread. We are very grateful to the Peplers, farmers in Edington, who support us with this project. We are also going to grow our own calabashes this year, for harvesting in November, and we hope to use them as musical instruments if they dry out satisfactorily. All our vegetables and flowers will be planted and will grow, ready for September, as ever. We will be preparing for the new children due to start in our school in September. Whilst we hope that they will be able to come into school in summer, as usual, we have to plan for the eventuality that schools might not open until September, and we shall then have a different sort of induction for these children. At this stage, we have no idea at all when schools will re-open.

Our meetings have had to be cancelled for the foreseeable future. For everyone this is a time of great uncertainty. Those of us lucky enough to have a garden can use it as an extra bit of space into which we can retreat. Some will be using this time to catch up on weeding and repairs.

Others will be just relaxing and enjoying the birdsong and watching the butterflies. For those of you who have never attended any of our garden club meetings I am taking this opportunity to describe some of our activities. Our garden club meetings over the past years have covered a wide range of topics. We have covered the history of a walled garden in Erlestoke, which is now a cricket pitch. We had a talk about the history of several National Trust walled gardens. We receive regular, interesting updates about the local weather statistics from one of our members who records the rainfall and frost incidents and temperature etc. We have learned about community projects; to introduce young people to gardening, to collect apples for juicing, to establish wildlife corridors, to allow wildlife space in churchyards, to distribute bird boxes. We have had talks from experts on trees, clematis, bulbs, vegetables, orchids and other plant groups. We have visited specialist nurseries, vineyards (and yes there was wine tasting), an organic vegetable smallholding, commercial flower growers and private gardens. We have been taught how to prune, willow weaving, how to clean garden tools, compost making, flower arranging and how to make Christmas decorations. We have learned about permaculture, raising chickens, the elements of garden design, the use of plants in medicine and how to forage for food in the wild. Sometimes our speakers bring seeds or plants or garden tools for sale at reasonable prices.

Some people are a bit frightened about joining a garden club as they feel that it is for people who already know about gardening and that they will not recognise the plants as it will be all latin names. That certainly is not the case with our club. We are a small, friendly club and our members range from complete beginners to experienced gardeners. Some of the experts do use latin names in their talks but nearly always mention the common names as well and more often than not show photos of the plants.

True gardeners love to share their knowledge and help others to learn about gardening. They are generous with their advice and quite often will share their plants too. Our club usually has a plant sale each year. It is a good and inexpensive way to pick up some new plants. If the plant has been growing in a local garden, you will know that it suits the local soil. And there are people on hand to advise you how to care for the plant if you would like that help. And there is nearly always delicious homemade cake and coffee at these events. When we do visits to nurseries or gardens we share transport to help people who cannot drive and also to reduce the number of cars for parking purposes.

We have a modest membership fee of just £10 per person per annum or £18 for a double membership. But if you just want to attend one or two talks you can pay £2 per visit to attend most events as a non-member. We usually meet on the second Tuesday of each month at Great Cheverell Village Hall, at 7.15 for a 7.30pm start. New members are always welcome. We look forward to seeing some new faces when normal life resumes. In the meanwhile, stay safe!



Experts don't always agree on the best way forward. Some public health advisors worry that the economic and social effects of prolonged lockdown could be devastating. Maybe by the time you read this the Prime Minister will be back at the helm and an exit plan will have been announced.

Who knows? Christian believers have been just as affected as everyone else when it comes to the current pandemic. Our faith gives us no immunity from viruses, or the disruption of lockdown measures. All of our church services and activities have been suspended. Fellowship is maintained by means of phone calls and Skype. Messages from the Bible are no longer proclaimed in church buildings, but posted online via YouTube and Facebook (see our website for more info: www.pbc-ebc. org.uk).

Covid-19 has exposed the limits of human knowledge, political leadership and scientific expertise. Hopefully we'll get out of this eventually, but no one can be sure how, or when. Our sense that, 'I am the master of my fate and captain of my soul' has taken a serious knock. The fact is that we were never really in control. Our best laid plans were always subject to disruption by unforeseeable events. Coronavirus has just brought this home to us in a big way.

In a changing and uncertain world, we need a message of hope that has stood the test of time. For generations believers have found encouragement in the words of Scripture. Psalm 46 assures us, 'God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble'. The psalm affirms, 'The Lord of Hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress'. God came to be with us in his Son, Jesus Christ. He is 'Immanuel, God with us' in human form. Jesus entered our world of suffering and grief to break the powers of sin and death. He died on the cross and rose again that we might be forgiven and have the hope of eternal life.

Psalm 46 points beyond this passing world to the City of God. The Book of Revelation offers a wonderful vision of that city where God will dwell with his people for ever: "And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain any more, for the former things have passed away." One day pandemics will be a thing of the past. In the meantime, it is good to know that we can turn to God and find him 'a very present help in trouble'.
